## April Theme: Child Health and Development

**Tuesday April 3rd: "BABIES":** This visually stunning film follows four babies during their first year on earth - from first breath to first steps. Across borders and cultures, from Mongolia to Namibia to San Francisco to Tokyo, BABIES re-defines the nonfiction art form and joyfully captures the earliest stages of the human journey that are both unique and universal to us all. *Please note that as the film is 79 minutes, will start it shortly after 12:00 pm, please feel free to join us even if you cannot make it for the start.*

**Tuesday April 10 – Child mortality and the Million Death Study"** Dr. Shaun Morris is a clinician-scientist in the Division of Infectious Diseases at the Hospital for Sick Children (SickKids) and an honorary scientist at the Centre for Global Health Research, Li Ka Shing Knowledge Institute, St. Michael's Hospital. He completed his medical degree at Queen's University, and Master's in Public Health at Johns Hopkins University. His clinical training in pediatrics and infectious diseases was at SickKids and his training in tropical medicine was at the Gorgas Memorial Institute and Universidad Peruana Cayetano Heredia Instituto de Medicina Tropical in Peru. He has worked clinically in Africa, Asia, and South America and his research interests include child mortality in India with a focus on infectious and vaccine preventable diseases.

**Tuesday April 17- Balint with Dr. Scott Allan.** Dr. Allan will be joining us for a Balint group discussion. Please bring cases that you would like to discuss. Balint groups are held to help general practitioners towards a better understanding of the emotional content of the doctor/patient relationship. The Balint method consists of regular case discussion in small groups under the guidance of a qualified group leader. The work of the group involves both training and research. Our group is open to all those involved in health care work including doctors, nurses, psychotherapists and counsellors.

**Tuesday April 24 Child and Youth Resilience Nazilla Khanlou,** RN, PhD, is Echo's inaugural Chair in Women's Mental Health Research in the Faculty of Health at York University and an Associate Professor in its School of Nursing. Professor Khanlou's clinical background is in psychiatric nursing. Her overall program of research is situated in the interdisciplinary field of community-based mental health promotion in general, and mental health promotion among youth and women in multicultural and immigrant-receiving settings in particular. She has received grants from peer-reviewed federal and provincial research funding agencies. Dr. Khanlou is the Co-Director of the Ontario Multicultural Health Applied Research Network (OMHARN). She is founder of the International Network on Youth Integration (INYI), an international network for knowledge exchange and collaboration on youth. She has published articles, books, and reports on immigrant youth and women, and mental health. She is involved in knowledge translation to the public through media.
